### HOW TO GET THERE

From Motril, or from the N-340, take the N-347 towards the port. When you reach the port. turn right towards "Plavas".

From Granada, take the A-44 and then the A-7 towards Malaga and then exit 325 onto the N-347a to the port of Motril. When you reach the port, turn right towards "playas".



### PARKING

There is no parking at the trail. It is possible to leave the vehicle near the entrance to the Reserva Concertada.



### **PUBLIC TRANSPORT**



# THE RED-KNOBBED COOT

With black plumage, it is very similar to the common coot, with a light blue bill and white frontal shield. but it has a pair of very striking protuberances on the front of its head, of an intense red colour, like small horns, which make it unmistakable, especially during the breeding season.

The coot is a purely North African species, almost exclusively Moroccan, which also reaches the south and east of the Iberian Peninsula and its population situation is critical. This is why it is included in the National and Andalusian Catalogues of Threatened Species as "Endangered" and at serious risk of extinction at a global level. At the beginning of the 1990s, it was on the verge of disappearing definitively from Spain, although today it is showing certain signs of general recovery, which allow us to look to the future with a certain optimism.

After the successful reintroduction in 2013 of several specimens bred in captivity, today the Suárez Pond has become the most important wetland for the future of the species in Europe. At the moment it is home to almost a quarter of the breeding pairs in our country, around 30.



Ruta de las Lagunas

The Ruta de las Lagunas trail in the Charca de Suárez Nature Reserve is a pleasant circular walk of just under two kilometres, linking a network of bird observatories strategically located to facilitate the contemplation of the fauna that inhabits the group of lagoons that make up this protected area. The Reserve is managed by Motril Town Council, with the collaboration of an extensive network of volunteers from the world of conservation, research and environmental education.

The path starts as soon as you go through the gate [1] which is accessed from the Camino del Pelaillo, a wide avenue located at the back of the coast of Motril where you can

find parking. If you can't find space there, continue some 150 metres in the direction of Salobreña until you come to a parking area for the beach. Although it is free to visit, the opening hours change with the seasons of the year and the breeding seasons of the endangered species, so it is necessary to contact the managers beforehand, especially if you intend to make a group visit.

Once inside the Reserve, continue along the branch of the path that is in front of you, in a northerly direction, but if in doubt, a signpost clearly indicates the way to go. Throughout the route there are many information signs, both about the protected area, its genesis and management, and about certain species of flora and fauna of interest, making the walk a pleasant but also very educational experience. It must not be

of nature in the
middle of a highly
developed area,
where the sound
of cars and human
activity is muffled by
the dense vegetation that
surrounds it and is transformed
into a comforting silence, broken only by the
twittering of birds or the quacking of ducks.

Beginning with the two observatories of the Laguna del Taraje (Tamarisk Lagoon) [2 and 3], the route will then take you to the observatory of Laguna de la Caña de Azúcar (Sugar Cane Lagoon) [4] and that of Laguna de las Aneas (Bulrush Lagoon) [5], and continue on to the two observatories of Laguna del Trébol (Clover Lagoon) [6 and 7] until coming to that of Laguna del Lirio (Lily Lagoon) [8], near the end of the trail. There is another observatory at Laguna de las Aneas, but it is exclusively of a scientific nature and cannot be visited. One of its observatories at this lagoon also shares space with the nature classroom, making it a unique and priceless resource





In order to enjoy birdwatching at the observatories, it is important to go there alone or in small groups, to behave as quietly as possible inside and, above all, never to lean out of the windows or take anything out of them (telescopes, lenses, hands...). The secret to seeing without being seen lies remaining in the dark all the time and without making any sound, so that the birds are calm and can be observed naturally, showing themselves as they really are.

The trail and its facilities mean that a very large number of different birds may be observed, many of them endangered. Fiftyone of Andalusia's ninety-two protected species are present in the area at some time of the year. In total, more than 160 different bird species have been counted, making the Charca de Suárez the main coastal wetland in the province of Granada. Of all of them, the true emblem of the Reserve is the red-knobbed coot, thanks to the successful reintroduction of the species carried out in recent years. But it's not just the redknobbed coot; other endangered species such as ferruginous duck and marbled duck also breed or live in the Reserve. which is increasingly becoming a true wildlife sanctuary. Something previously inconceivable for a site that was on the verge of being drained and urbanised only a few years ago and a model of management which is exportable to other areas of our Autonomous Community.
